

DATA FOR PROGRESS

Between August 24 and August 25, 2020, Data for Progress conducted a survey of likely Democratic primary voters in Massachusetts using text-to-web and panel responses. The responses were weighted to be representative of likely voters by age, gender, education, race, and geography. The survey was conducted in English. Margin of Error is +/- 4 percentage points, accounting for the design effect, with a 95% Confidence Interval.

NB: subgroups with a n-size less than 50 (<50) are not shown on these cross-tabs. We choose not to display N<50 subgroups because the sample is too small to have statistical significance. We did, however, take samples of these subgroups for representational and weighting purposes to accurately reflect the electorate makeup. Some values may not add up to 100 due to rounding.
