

# DATA FOR PROGRESS

From April 19 to May 4, 2024, Data for Progress conducted 4,923 respondent interviews over four pooled surveys of U.S. likely voters nationally using web panel respondents. Each sample was weighted to be representative of likely voters by age, gender, education, race, geography, and 2020 recalled vote. The surveys were conducted in English. The margin of error associated with the sample size is  $\pm 1$  percentage point, and crosstabs of subgroups of the sample are subject to increased margins of error.

To qualify as a swing voter, a respondent must meet three of the following four indicators: (a) Their vote choices between 2020 vote recall, the 2024 two-way ballot, and the 2024 six-way ballot are not consistent; (b) Their vote choices between the 2024 two-way ballot, the 2024 six-way ballot, and generic congressional ballot are not all consistent; (c) They report similar ratings for Biden favorability and Trump favorability, or for Biden job approval and Trump favorability; (d) They say they are considering at least two options in 2024 (Biden, Trump, third-party, not voting). Additionally, respondents who say they are "definitely" voting for a certain candidate on the six-way ballot or who say they will "definitely not vote" at all in the 2024 presidential election are excluded. There are 690 swing voters in our sample. The margin of error associated with the sample size for this subgroup is  $\pm 4$  percentage points.

NB: subgroups with a n-size less than 50 (<50) are not shown on these cross-tabs. We choose not to display N<50 subgroups because the sample is too small to have statistical significance. We did, however, take samples of these subgroups for representational and weighting purposes to accurately reflect the electorate makeup. Some values may not add up to 100 due to rounding.
