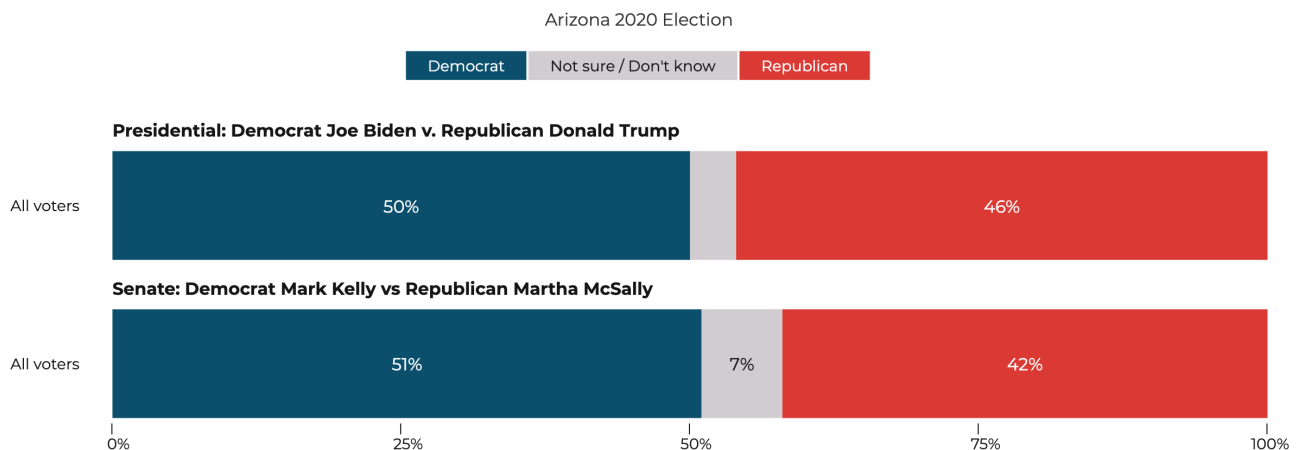
Democrat Mark Kelly leads Republican Martha McSally by 9 points

Democrat Joe Biden has a 4 point lead over Republican President Donald Trump

## ARIZONA SENATE

In the Arizona special election, Democrat Mark Kelly is going up against Republican Martha McSally, appointed by the Governor to fill the remainder of the term in a seat vacated by John McCain's death. We find that Kelly has a lead against McSally, 51-42 percent.

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## ARIZONA PRESIDENTIAL

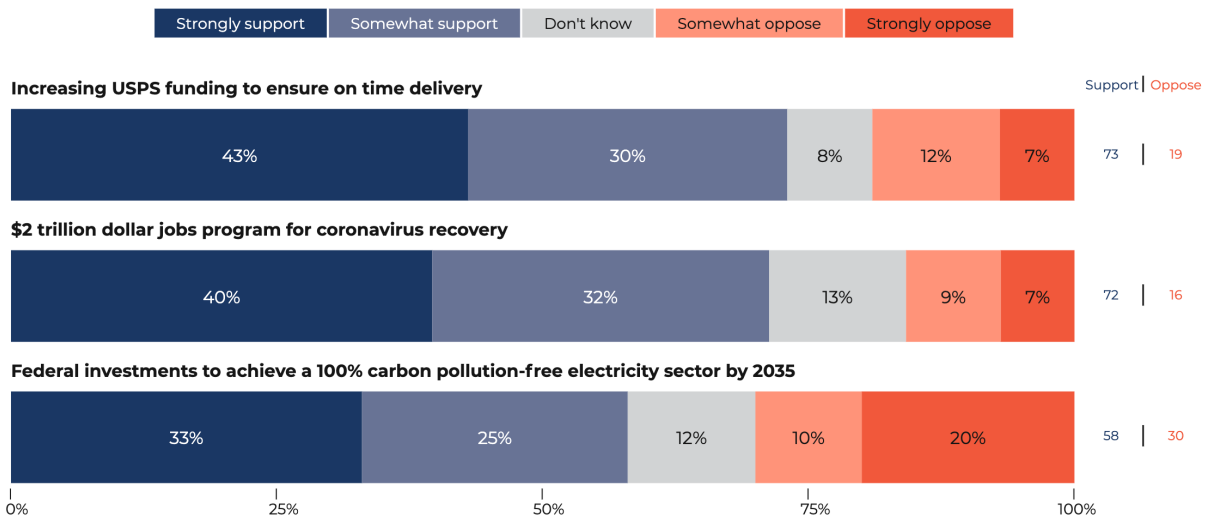
Joe Biden leads Donald Trump by 4 points. Arizona went for Trump in 2016 by 3.5 percentage points.

# POLICIES

Voters in this state broadly support Democratic policy priorities. They favor extending Coronavirus relief until the unemployment rate falls back to where it was before the crisis, 59 to 25 percent. 72 percent support a jobs program to help build infrastructure and public health to recover from the coronavirus emergency. Providing additional funding to the USPS to deliver essential needs is also popular, supported by 73 percent of Arizona likely voters. We find 58 percent support for federal investments to achieve a 100% carbon free electricity sector.

Would you support or oppose the following proposals?

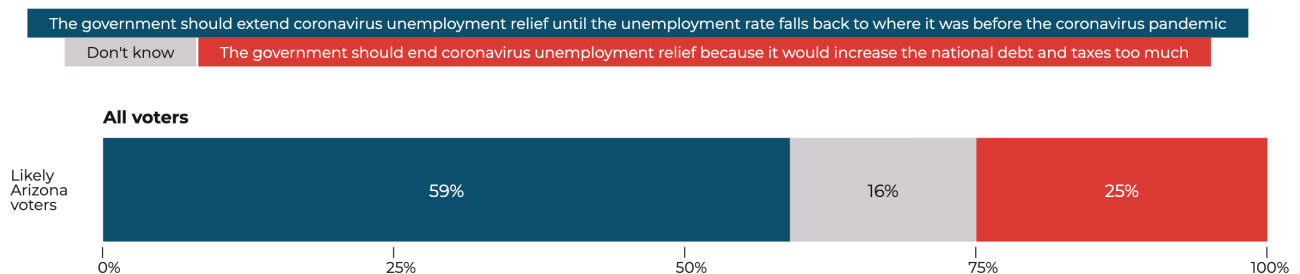


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## Voters in Arizona Support Extending Coronavirus Economic Relief

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# METHODOLOGY

From 9/23/2020 to 9/28/2020, Data for Progress conducted a survey of 808 likely voters in Arizona using web panel and SMS respondents. The sample was weighted to be representative of likely voters by age, gender, education, race, and voting history. The survey was conducted in English. The margin of error is +/- 3.4 percentage points.
